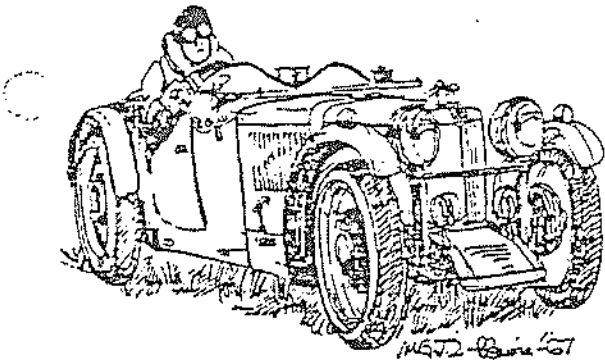

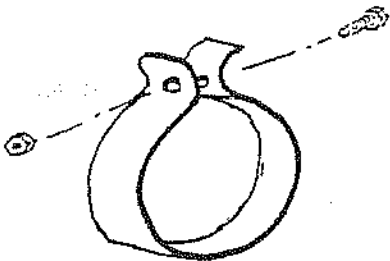

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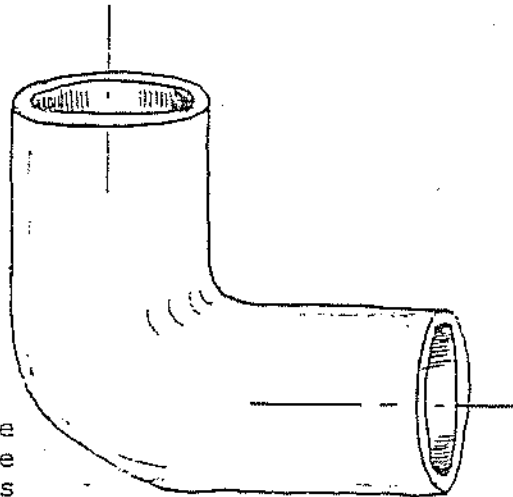
RADIATOR HOSES AND HOSE CLAMPS



For those who want mint restorations, the original hose clamps looked like the one pictured to the left. (see page 39 of the "Instructional Manual")

Thus for restoration you are just as correct in using a modern clamp as you are in using the wire type as used later on the T-Series!

Top hose -- inside diameter is $1\frac{1}{2}$ ". It has a 90° bend. The length from center line to edge is 4" on one side and $4\frac{5}{16}$ " on the other.



The bottom hose -- inside diameter changes from $1\frac{7}{16}$ " on the left side of the picture below to a $1\frac{3}{16}$ " diameter on the right side below. The center line turns through two 45° bends and is offset by $2\frac{9}{16}$ ". The length is $6\frac{7}{8}$ ".



Hoses are available from major suppliers in England.

Original hose clamps are not available.
